ANNUAL REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE.

OFFICE OF CHIEF OF POLICE,

MILWAUKEE, April 2, 1888.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Milwaukee :

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit herewith the annual report of the Police Department for the year ending March 31, 1888, showing the work done by the force as well as other matters deemed of interest to your honorable body.

The statistical lists accompanying this report show that the total number of arrests the past year was 4,401 against 3,726 the previous year, showing an increase of 675. This increase is entirely for minor offenses, and is in proportion to the large increase of our population the past year.

The city has been remarkably free from crime and in that respect compares most favorably with other cities of our size. I attribute this gratifying state of affairs largely to the vigilance and activity of the detective force, who have arrested and driven from the city 234 criminals and suspicious persons. This large number, who almost without exception admitted their criminal antecedents, would certainly have committed many depredations

had they been permitted to remain unknown in our midst any length of time.

In tracing criminals who fled from the city after committing crime, we have received valuable assistance from the Police Departments of other cities for which we are under many obligations and which we have at all times endeavored to reciprocate. We have traced to and brought back from other places 15 persons and have arrested here and sent to other places for trial 27 persons charged, with crime.

This force is apportioned as follows; First precinct, Central station, 86; Second precinct, South side station, 45; Third precinct, West side station, 47. Of the 148 patrolmen, 12 are detailed for special duty at street crossings, bridges, etc., 12 for patrol wagon service, 7 for duties as stationkeepers, 35 for day patrol and 82 for night patrol.

With the large extent of our territory and the rapid growth of our population, the number of patrolmen available

for patrol duty is insufficient and I therefore recommend that 25 additional patrolmen be appointed.

By chapter 483 of the laws of 1887, the title of First Lieutenant was changed to that of Inspector and that of Second Lieutenant to that of Captain. The same law also authorized the appointment of 4 Lieutenants of which 3 only were appointed, there being no immediate necessity for the fourth. These and all other appointments were made in strict compliance with rules established by the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners. Two examinations for promotion were held by the Board, which resulted in the following appointments:

- Detective J. Laubenheimer, promoted Lieutenant.
- Detective Wm. Struebig, promoted Lieutenant.
- Sergeant John Kranich, promoted Lieutenant.
- Roundsmen M. J. Mooney, promoted Sergeant.

- Roundsmen Wm. Schilke, promoted Detective.
- Patrolman Wm. Schilke, promoted Roundsmen.
- Patrolman G. C. Green, promoted Roundsmen.
- Patrolman Nic. Luchsinger, promoted Roundsmen.
- Patrolman Frank Koge, promoted Roundsmen.
- Patrolman Chas. Arnold, promoted Roundsmen.

In addition to these, patrolman Dennis Sullivan and Peter Schmidt, after having served six months in the capacity of detective, were on the 10th of March appointed as such and confirmed by the Board.

The changes among the patrolmen were as follows: At the beginning of the year there were 4 vacancies; during the

year 7 were promoted, 3 resigned, 6 were dismissed, and the Common Council authorized the appointment of 15 additional on May 1st, making a total of 35 vacancies, of which 34 were filled by appointment, leaving one vacancy.

The Board of Fire and Police Commissioners held three examinations during the year, examining 102 applicants for patrolmen, of which 56 passed. Of these 56, 11 were rejected by the medical examiner, 8 were objectionable and 34 were appointed, leaving 3 on the list.

This system of regulating appointments has continued to produce good results. Instead of the political pressure formerly used in favor of applicants, these places are now open to all citizens, within proper restriction as to age and length of residence in the city, who can demonstrate their fitness both as to educational and physical qualification before an impartial and non-partisan board.

In this connection I cheerfully acknowledge the many courtesies extended to me by the members and the Secretary of the board.

Complaints were made against 32 members of the force during the year for violations of the rules. Investigations resulted as follows: Dismissed 6, temporary suspension with loss of pay 9, deduction from pay 2, reprimanded 13 and acquitted 2.

Our Central and West Side Stations are in excellent condition, being almost new, and are admirably adapted for police purposes. The South Side Station, while containing a good cell room and office, has a basement which is almost constantly under water, which makes the building an unhealthy

place of abode. I am advised by the Board of Public Works that the defect cannot be remedied unless a different grade is established for Florida street and that street otherwise improved. The location is also not as desirable as it should be, being in the extreme corner of a very large precinct, composed of the entire South Side and the recently annexed village of Bay View. Considering these facts, I would respectfully recommend that a new station be built on a lot located nearer the business center of that precinct, or that the necessary repairs be made on the present building, and that a sub-station be built in the Kinnickinnic valley. A room should also be provided, similar to the one in the West Side Station, to afford temporary shelter in winter to homeless wanderers.

Our police alarm and signal system has been considerably enlarged the past year. We have now nearly 100 miles of wire, divided into seven circuits, with 122 signal alarm boxes, of which 30 were put up the past year. A galvanometer and rheostat was purchased for testing purposes, by means of which the exact location of a break in the wires may be ascertained almost instantly.

The cable across the river containing all the West side lines was broken by a dredge August 11th, which caused a serious interruption and necessitated the laying of a new cable which is used jointly by the Police and Fire Departments.

There is an urgent necessity for putting our wires underground. At several of the recent conflagrations these wires proved to be such great hindrance to our excellent fire department that they had to be cut, thereby isolating headquarters from a large part of our city. I trust that your

Honorable Body will make an appropriation sufficient to put all city wires underground and then compel private corporations to follow the good example.

Our patrol wagons, of which we have three fully equipped and one in reserve, have been of great service and are now indispensable for efficient police service. The statistical lists give all the details of the work performed by this branch of the department.

In conclusion, I wish to express my deep gratitude to his honor, Mayor Wallber, and to your Honorable Board for the hearty co-operation and kind assistance as well as the courtesies extended to me at all times.
