The Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—The annual report of the operation of the Police Department for the year ending March 31, 1899, is herewith respectfully submitted.

Number of arrests made was 5,266—4,693 males and 573 females.

The police force remains the same numerically as for five years past, viz., 1 chief, 1 inspector, 1 captain, 4 lieutenants, 10 detectives, 4 sergeants (1 vacancy), 8 roundsmen (1 vacancy), 275 patrolmen (6 vacancies), 1 secretary, 1 clerk, 1 assistant superintendent of police alarm, 1 batteryman, 2 linemen, 1 chief operator, 5 operators, 1 matron, 4 janitors; a total membership of 321, including 8 vacancies.

The needs of the Police Department are many, but in view of the short appropriation allowed for the maintenance of the department during the ensuing year, it would serve no purpose at this time to enumerate them.

Statistical tables exhibiting the work of the department in detail are hereto attached.

J. T. Janssen, Esq., Chief of Police:

SIR—I have the honor to submit my annual report of the Police Alarm Telegraph Department for the year ending March 31, 1899.

During the past year an unusual amount of work was done in keeping the lines and apparatus in good working order.

One hundred and five Blake transmitters and bell telephone receivers, located in patrol boxes, were exchanged for the improved solid-back Blake and new style receivers, thereby giving the department the very best of telephone service. These changes are being made almost every day and will be continued till the work is completed.

A new metallic box circuit was built and the Mayor's residence was put in connection with this office. The addition of eighteen patrol boxes will be of great assistance to our patrolmen, as some of the remote districts were poorly provided for. The locations are as follows:

1. Corner Chicago and Jackson streets.
2. Corner Concord and Oakland avenue.
3. Corner Washington street and Fourteenth avenue.
4. Corner Rogers street and Muskego avenue.
5. Corner Clarence street and Eighth avenue.
6. Corner Conway and Lenox streets.
7. Corner Potter and Howell avenue.
8. Goodrich Dock.
9. Corner Grand avenue and Thirty-fifth street.
10. Corner State and Twenty-seventh streets.
11. Corner Prairie and Fifth streets.

12. Corner Brown and Twenty-ninth streets.
13. North Avenue Depot.
14. Corner North avenue and Sixteenth street.
15. Corner Wright street and Fond du Lac avenue.
16. Corner Center and Twelfth streets.
17. Corner Chambers and Richards streets.
18. Corner Concordia avenue and Richards street.

Eighty-four patrol boxes were repainted by the Supt. of School Repairs.

The old 20-conductor Okonite cable laid in 1888 on Broadway, between the Central Station and Erie street, and replaced by a 12-pair cable, was taken up and partly relaid on upper Grand avenue. It is giving fairly good results.

Two armored cables, one crossing the river at Oneida street and the other at East Water street, were destroyed by a dredge, causing for a time a serious interruption. These old cables were practically of little value to the service, as they were not adapted for metallic circuit work. The Fire Department and Wisconsin Telephone Company kindly permitted the use of their spare wires temporarily, and in order to return them it will be absolutely necessary to purchase enough cable to repair the damage.

The Milwaukee Electric Railway and Light Company were permitted to connect their operating room with this department, thus affording better facilities in reporting accidents, etc., which, to a large extent, are given over our patrol boxes and exchange lines. Permission was also granted the Julius Andrae Sons Co. to connect the following banks with a signal circuit: First National Bank, Wisconsin National Bank, Marshall-Ilisley Bank, National Exchange Bank, Northwestern National Insurance Co., Marine and Fire Insurance Company Bank, and Milwaukee National Bank.

All patrol boxes, lines, cables, batteries and instruments are regularly inspected so as to insure the best possible service.

The work in the operating room is constantly increasing. The number of messages sent, connections made and the answering of inquiries of all kinds are so varied that it is almost impossible to classify them. The operator's report shows that 692,996 reports were received from police officers, 3,917 calls were transmitted to the patrol houses, 457 calls were received for the ambulance, and about 175,000 connections were made over our private and exchange lines. It gives me great pleasure to state that not one false alarm was recorded from our city patrol boxes.

The lathe and necessary tools purchased last year for our repair shop have proven of much value, as all light repairs can now be made by the batteryman of this department.

The manhole work performed by the Sewer Department was of the best workmanship, and the ditch work which was done by the various ward men was entirely satisfactory.

The cost for electric light and power furnished from the City Hall plant was reduced from five to four cents per kilowatt.

The Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit herewith the annual report of the Police Department for the year ending March 31st, 1900.

The total number of arrests made during the year was 4811—4233 males, 578 females, a net decrease of 455 from the previous year. By reference to the table hereto annexed it will be seen that, although there was an increase of 40 arrests for offenses against the state laws, the arrests for breaches of the peace, violations of city ordinances and miscellaneous cases fell off 495 from the preceding year.

The showing made is certainly a very gratifying one and tends to maintain the reputation Milwaukee enjoys as one of the most orderly communities in the country. This condition is quite frequently attributed to the exceptionally lawabiding character of our citizens; and, while I cheerfully concede this excellent quality in our people, the fact must not be overlooked that the police department has been an important factor in promoting and maintaining this standard of municipal order; and, if this condition is to continue, provision must be made to supply the ever increasing demands upon this department from year to year as the city grows in area and population. Twenty years ago the city had three police stationhouses. Officers were then expected to walk their prisoners or convey them to the station as best they could in wheelbarrows or other convenient vehicles. The advent of patrol wagons and the police alarm system placed the department in a position to cover the city quite thoroughly for many years. The city has now, however, outgrown that equipment and it is becoming almost impossible to properly protect the outlying territory from three stationhouses. I expect in the near future to ask for an issue of bonds to be used in the purchase of sites and erecting at least two stationhouses, and I sincerely trust that your Honorable Body will recognize the reasonableness and justice of that request.

I intend also to present for your consideration an ordinance providing for a slight increase in the number of patrolmen and detectives and to

abolish the rank of roundsman and increase the number of sergeants correspondingly. The duties of a roundsman are very important and it is absolutely necessary that capable and reliable men be selected for that work. However, the difference in the salary of five dollars per month is not a sufficient inducement for patrolmen to seek promotion to the rank of roundsmen, and the greatest difficulty has been experienced in obtaining proper men to fill the positions. I hope that the contemplated change may meet approval.

Statistical tables showing the work of the department in detail are hereto annexed.

GENTLEMEN—The annual report of the Police Department for the year ending March 31st, 1901, is herewith respectfully submitted.

The department on March 31st comprised 1 chief, 1 inspector, 1 captain, 4 lieutenants, 12 detectives, 14 sergeants, 273 patrolmen, 1 secretary, 1 clerk, 1 assistant superintendent of police alarm, 1 batteryman, 2 linemen, 1 chief operator, 4 operators, 1 matron and 4 janitors, a total membership of 322.

The total number of arrests made during the year was 4,794—4,237 males, 557 females, a net decrease of 17 from the previous year.

REPORT.

OFFICE OF ASST. SUPT. POLICE ALARM TELEGRAPH,
MILWAUKEE, April 1, 1901.

J. T. Janssen, Esq., Chief of Police:

SIR—I have the honor to submit my annual report of the Police Alarm Telegraph System for the year ending March 31, 1901.

The number of telephones in use is 223, of which 195 are located in patrol boxes, connecting with 16 double metallic circuits, and 28 private line instruments, requiring together 252½ miles of wire.

The underground system now consists of 123,358 feet of steel and vitrified clay conduits, with 103,834 feet of cables varying from one to forty conductors.

During the last year the system was extended as greatly as the funds at hand would permit; 17,018 feet of cable was laid, 17,796 feet of vitrified clay conduits and 7,584 feet of steel and galvanized iron pipes were laid, mostly in streets where permanent pavements were put down.

At all points where the aerial lines connect with the underground cables, protectors were installed in cable and patrol boxes, thereby reducing the risks of having the cables injured by high potential currents.

During the year 15 telephones were burnt out in various patrol boxes, and several signal boxes were badly damaged by arc light wires coming in contact with the signal wires. To protect the patrolmen and members of the department, as well as the delicate apparatus, from this dangerous current, I am installing from time to time additional protectors in such places where crosses are most liable to occur on the aerial lines.

The burnt telephones were exchanged by the Wisconsin Telephone Co. free of charge.

To permit the Wisconsin Telephone Co. to construct a subway under the Milwaukee river at the foot of Mason street, a 20-conductor armored submarine cable had to be destroyed. Before this work was started, however, a temporary cable was laid and connected in service by the said company. In return two ducts are at our disposal in the subway and a new armored cable was furnished us.

I regret to have to report that during the last year considerable trouble was caused by careless workmen drawing cables in and out of the Telephone Company's conduits. Although we have a city ordinance which gives us the right to use their subways, I consider it very poor economy to make any further use of the privilege and endanger the efficiency of the service.

On Sunday, March 10th, the heavy sleet and wind storm which swept over our city did considerable damage to all overhead lines, but I am pleased to state that our system was but slightly affected. This was due principally on account of having a large portion of the wires underground.

The eight patrol boxes purchased will be set up during the coming year.

All the apparatus, telephones, batteries, cables, aerial lines, etc., are in excellent condition at the present time. They are constantly tested and inspected so as to secure the best possible results.

The Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit herewith the annual report, being my fourteenth, of the operation of the Police Department for the year ending March 31, 1902.

The strength of the force is as follows: 1 chief, 1 inspector, 1 captain, 4 lieutenants, 12 detectives, 14 sergeants, 269 patrolmen, 1 secretary, 1 clerk, 1 assistant superintendent of police alarm, 1 battery-man, 2 linemen, 1 chief operator, 5 operators, 1 matron and 4 janitors, a total of 319.

The total number of arrests made during the year was 5,260, as against 4,794 last year, being an increase of 466. There were 299 more state cases and 194 more city cases than the previous year, while the miscellaneous cases fell off 27.

Statistical tables showing the work of the department in detail are hereto annexed.

SIR—I have the honor to submit my annual report of the Police Alarm Telegraph System for the year ending March 31, 1902.

During the past year four new patrol boxes were added to the system as follows:

1. National and Thirtieth avenues.
2. Canal street and Muskego avenue.
3. Concordia avenue and North Pierce street.
4. Hopkins and Twenty-fourth streets.

The underground system was extended by laying 18,135 feet of vitrified clay pipe and 10,882 feet of cable. All the old paper insulated cables which were drawn out of conduit to make room for cables having a larger capacity of wires, and found to be in good condition, were relaid in a steel pipe on the Sixteenth street viaduct to National and Eleventh avenues connecting on the west side with the new Grand avenue cable. This gives the south side two independent cable routes with a total of 40 wires. About one half of the patrol boxes which were formerly working through the Broadway cable were transferred to this new route.

A 20-conductor armored cable was laid in the syphon at Muskego avenue bridge and a 40-conductor paper insulated cable was laid through the subway of the Wisconsin Telephone Co. under the river at the foot of Mason street.

A 20-conductor lead cable was corroded by electrolytic action from current escaping from the rails of the street railway lines. The damage done was inconsiderable and was repaired in a very short time. During the coming year I will prepare a new chart showing our conduit system, take measurements with volt and ampere meters at every manhole and get the difference of potential from the charged cables. These measurements will assist me in determining what action to take to prevent if possible any further damage to the cables.

At Clinton street bridge a 3-in. galvanized iron pipe was laid 26 feet under the river and extended on both sides to manholes connecting with the underground conduit. The intention is to place a lead cable having a capacity of 10 conductors in this pipe. At the present time all patrol boxes south of this line are working through a cable owned by the Wisconsin Telephone Company.

The new test and relay board, storage batteries and a board to control them recently ordered and which are to replace the old apparatus and gravity batteries, will be a valuable improvement to the depart-

ment; the boards will be equipped with the latest appliances and especially arranged for rapid signal work. Plans and specifications are now being considered for a new central energy telephone switchboard.

The general condition of the apparatus, underground cables, aerial lines, batteries, etc., are in good working order, the same method of inspections being followed as has been customary in previous years.

The linemen have been constantly employed during the year in rebuilding the lines, laying conduits, drawing in cables and making the necessary extensions.

The electrical repair and drafting work most of which was done by the batteryman was executed in a very creditable manner. In the operating room the demands on that branch of the service is gradually increasing. The large number of reports, telephone messages received and transmitted and connections made over the system was performed by the operator to the entire satisfaction of this department.

It gives me pleasure to state that during the past four years no false alarms have been recorded from the city patrol boxes.

For detailed statement I respectfully refer to your consideration the tables annexed to this report.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—The annual report of the Police Department, being my fifteenth, for the year ending March 31, 1903, is herewith respectfully transmitted.

The department is comprised as follows, viz: 1 chief, 1 inspector, 1 captain, 4 lieutenants, 12 detectives, 14 sergeants, 276 patrolmen, 1 surgeon, 1 secretary, 1 clerk, 1 assistant superintendent of police alarm telegraph, 1 batteryman, 2 linemen, 1 chief operator, 5 operators, 1 matron, 4 janitors, a total of 327.

Total number of arrests, 5,737, as against 5,250 for the preceding year, an increase of 477. There were 154 more state cases and 324 more city cases, while the miscellaneous arrests decreased 1. Females arrested numbered 596, an increase of 3. Notwithstanding the increase in arrests, the standard of good order maintained in the city has not been impaired. No serious crimes or disturbances mark the record of the year.

The appointment of a surgeon in October last has demonstrated the wisdom of the ordinance creating that position in the decreased time lost by officers and the knowledge that the department is getting all the service that the city pays for.

Tables showing the work of the department in detail are hereto annexed, also reports of the Police Surgeon and the Assistant Superintendent of Police Alarm.

REPORT OF THE POLICE SURGEON.

John T. Janssen, Chief of Police:

SIR—I herewith submit a report of my services as Police Surgeon for the past three months of the year 1903.

I have made 101 visits to officers reported sick, and have performed such other professional services as have been required.

The number of officers reported sick was 90, and the total number of days of their sickness was 708 $\frac{1}{4}$.

The sickness of the year has been incidental to the work and its exposure, and the force has been free from epidemics, with the exception of La Grippe, which disease has been very prevalent during the past winter, and taken together with colds, disabled 61 men and caused a loss of 401 $\frac{1}{4}$ days.

John T. Janssen, Esq., Chief of Police:

SIR—I was promoted Assistant Superintendent of Police Alarm Telegraph January 14, 1903, to succeed Mr. O. D. Kleinsteuber, under whose able management, extending over a period of twenty years, the telephone and signal system has grown and developed until it is now conceded to be second to none in the country.

During the past year a modern switch-board, a relay board and storage battery, embracing all the latest improvements, have been installed, doing away with all vitriol and dry batteries, thus accomplishing a material saving in labor and maintenance, besides insuring accuracy in operation and affording better facilities for testing and locating disturbances.

Last year 20,281 feet of vitrified clay conduit was laid, and 55 manholes built. It is expected that about the same extension will be made the coming season. Cables, wires and apparatus are in good working order, no false alarms having been received and no serious trouble encountered during the year.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—The annual report of the Police Department, being my sixteenth, for the year ending March 31, 1904, is herewith respectfully transmitted.

The department is composed as follows, viz: 1 chief, 1 inspector, 1 captain, 6 lieutenants, 16 sergeants, 16 detectives, 306 patrolmen, 1 surgeon, 1 secretary, 1 clerk, 1 assistant superintendent of police alarm, 1 batteryman, 3 linemen, 1 chief operator, 5 operators, 1 matron, and 6 janitors, a total of 368.

The new branch station at Third and Hadley streets was occupied April 1, 1904, being designated No. 5. The branch station on Allis street in Bay View was opened May 2, 1904, and designated No. 4.

The city is now divided into police precincts as follows:

No. 1 (Central) includes the Sixteenth, Fourth, Third, Seventh, First and Eighteenth Wards.

No. 2, the Fifth, Eighth, Twenty-third wards and those portions of the Eleventh and Twelfth wards lying north of Mitchell street.

No. 3, the Second, Sixth, Ninth, Fifteenth, Nineteenth and those portions of the Tenth and Twenty-second wards lying south of North avenue.

No. 4, the Fourteenth, Seventeenth and those portions of the Eleventh and Twelfth wards lying south of Mitchell street.

No. 5, the Thirteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first and those portions of the Tenth and Twenty-second wards lying north of North avenue.

The total number of arrests 5,666, as against 5,737 the previous year, a decrease of 71. There were 55 more arrests for State offenses, while the arrests for minor offenses declined 126.

Tables showing work of the department are hereto annexed.

SIR—I herewith submit a report of my services as Police Surgeon for the year ending March 31, 1904.

The number of officers reported sick was 282, and the total number of days of their sickness was 2,128.

The sickness of the year has been incidental to the work and its exposure, and the force has been free from epidemics; 19 men were injured, one officer contracted small pox, four had appendicitis, and one typhoid fever, these being the most serious cases of illness.

John T. Janssen, Esq., Chief of Police:

SIR—I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending March 31, 1904.

With reference to our present system I wish to state that we have overcome and perfected the peculiarities of a police signal in conjunction with a telephone system; the result is that we have to-day the most effective police signal and telephone system in use.

We have now 202 patrol boxes, three having been added during the past year, and 27 private telephones, all communicating with each other and with the whole of the Milwaukee telephone exchange when desired.

During the past year the apparatus of the 202 patrol boxes has been changed to a more modern and up-to-date mechanism, thereby insuring safety from dangerous high potential currents, doing away with the bad consequences of lighting arresters, the application of testing switches, replacing the old 'phone with a long distance transmitter, and in other minor ways have reduced it to the greatest reliability of action.

The two new police stations, Fourth Precinct on Allis street and the Fifth Precinct at Third and Hadley streets, were installed with telephones, gongs and other electrical equipments.

A three-inch pipe and a submarine cable connecting the south side with the east side was considerably damaged, which in repairing same necessitated the assistance of a diver and a dredge.

The underground system was extended by laying 16,500 feet of vitrified clay pipe, drawing in 14,888 feet of cable and building 48 manholes.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—The annual report of the Police Department for the year ending March 31, 1905, is herewith respectfully transmitted.

The department is made up as follows, viz: 1 chief; 1 inspector; 1 captain; 6 lieutenants; 16 sergeants; 16 detectives; 307 patrolmen; 1 surgeon; 1 secretary; 1 clerk; 1 assistant superintendent of police alarm; 1 batteryman; 3 linemen; 1 chief operator; 5 operators; 1 matron and 6 janitors; total, 369.

Total arrests, 6,153, an increase of 487 over the previous year. There was an increase of 74 state cases, an increase of 358 city cases, and a decrease of 25 miscellaneous arrests.

It has been my practice for several years to make recommendations and suggestions to your Honorable Body from time to time during the year as the needs of the department seemed to me to demand instead of waiting to embody such recommendations in the annual report.

Statistical tables showing work of the department in detail are hereto annexed.

SIR—I herewith submit a report of my services as Police Surgeon for the year ending March 31, 1905.

I have made 371 visits to officers reported sick and have performed such other professional services as have been required.

The number of officers reported sick was 313; of these 36 were injured, and the total number of days of their sickness was 2,264.

The sickness of the year has been incidental to the work and its exposure and the force has been free from epidemic with the exception of diarrhoeal troubles.

John T. Janssen, Esq., Chief of Police:

SIR—I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending March 31, 1905.

The present system is composed of 209 patrol boxes, seven having been added during the past year, which are distributed on 27 distinct alarm circuits. Besides this, we have 30 communicating telephone lines, five patrol-house call wires and five battery feeders to all precincts.

We have $103\frac{1}{8}$ miles of aerial wire for patrol box circuits, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles of aerial wire for telephone lines, $14\frac{3}{8}$ miles of underground paper cable, the capacity of which ranges from 6 to 132 conductors.

During the past year 26,920 feet of cable were laid, part of which was drawn in on Clinton Street from Park Street to Wilson Street, enabling me to return wires loaned us by the Wisconsin Telephone Co.

The underground conduit system was extended by laying 22,660 feet of vitrified clay pipe and the building of 62 man-holes. Two $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch galvanized iron pipe were laid in the river at Broadway bridge; a warehouse for electrical supplies was built in the rear of Precinct No. 3; 26 patrol boxes were painted; 18 cement foundations were made, and a dial-switch operated by an electric motor was installed for rapid testing of circuit-relays, retardation-coils and registers.

The service rendered by the patrol wagons and ambulance, also the work done by the telegraph corps, exceeds any previous year; about 968,-316 communications were transmitted by the operators; the linemen have been constantly employed building and rebuilding lines.

The sleet storm of Sunday, March 19th, caused considerable damage to our system, wrecking telephone poles in different parts of the city on which some of our lines were fastened. With the aid of extra help the damage was temporarily repaired and at 11 o'clock Sunday night the lines were again in operation and the service restored.

On October 10th an explosion caused by a defective underground terminal of the Mil. Elec. R. and L. Co. damaged our cable in the man-hole at the corner of State and Third Streets. One cable of 60 wires and

another of 40 wires were ruined and the service of the Northwest section of the city was for a short time interrupted.

Breaks, crosses and other minor troubles were promptly attended to, and the adjusting of instruments and its mechanism received the best attention.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—The annual report of the Police Department for the year ending March 31, 1906, being my eighteenth, is herewith respectfully transmitted.

The force was increased by 30 patrolmen during the past year, and is now constituted as follows: 1 chief; 1 inspector; 1 captain; 6 lieutenants; 16 sergeants; 16 detectives; 337 patrolmen; 1 surgeon; 1 secretary; 1 assistant secretary; 1 clerk; 1 assistant superintendent of police alarm; 1 batteryman; 1 chief lineman; 3 linemen; 1 chief operator; 6 operators; 1 matron and 6 janitors; total 403.

Total number of arrests 6804, as against 6,153 the previous year, showing an increase of 651; state cases increased 191 and city cases 385, while miscellaneous arrests decreased 25.

The acquisition of the Armory property by the city will furnish much needed facilities for police headquarters, which have for some years been too cramped for the growing demands of the department. I respectfully recommend that your Honorable Body take early steps to provide for a bond issue in a sufficient amount to remodel and extend the Armory into a modern police building with adequate quarters for patrol, ambulance and drill-room, also to accommodate the Municipal and District Courts, District Attorney's department and Clerk of the Criminal Courts. This arrangement will prove economical and advantageous in many ways, grouping as it does the various departments of criminal justice of the city and county, including the Sheriff's office, in convenient proximity.

Detailed information of the work of the department will be found in the annexed tables.

REPORT OF THE POLICE SURGEON.

John T. Janssen, Chief of Police:

SIR—I herewith submit a report of my services as Police Surgeon for the year ending April 1, 1906.

I have made 372 visits to officers reported sick and have performed such other professional services as have been required.

The number of officers reported sick was 314; of these 35 were injured and the total number of days of their sickness was 3027.

The sickness of the year has been incidental to the work and its exposure and the force has been free from epidemic with the exception of colds and diarrhoeal troubles.

There was one death that of Patrolman John Jahnke Jr., from a disease of the spinal cord.

MILWAUKEE, WIS., March 31, 1906.

John T. Janssen, Esq., Chief of Police:

SIR—I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending March 31, 1906.

The most important work was the placing of 26,419 feet of underground cable, notably to all the precincts, thereby assuring wagon-calls and telephone communications; also the drawing in of cables in other parts of the city, thus avoiding all possible overhead dangers. 8,419 feet of clay conduits were laid and 21 manholes built.

The aerial system received a thorough overhauling, the slack or sag was taken out of 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles of wire by pulling up same to its proper tension. At places where wires turn short corners and also where they dead-end double crossarms were attached, making the work more substantial.

Much time was devoted to a general inspection of patrolboxes, of which we have 220, the result being that all have the proper appearance. 11 boxes were added during the past year, 17 were taken to the carpenter shop for repairs, 31 decayed pine floors were replaced with new maple floorings, 204 were painted, 18 cement foundations were made, 10 of which were for boxes in new locations and 8 to replace old decayed foundations made of wood, and for the purpose of preserving patrolbox transmitters 100 were dipped in a black enamel preparation. If the process proves successful I will enamel others.

The appointment of a Chief Lineman helped me considerable in the execution of outside construction and the work in the operating-room having increased, the appointment of one additional operator permitted me to divide the work and deliver better and quicker service.

Two false alarms were received through a call from the telephone Company's exchange by some unknown person, evidently for malicious purposes. Occurrences of this kind cannot be avoided. No false alarms have been received during the year due to our system.

The service rendered by the operators, patrolwagons and ambulance are hereto attached.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN:—The annual report of the Police Department for the year ending March 31st, 1907, is herewith respectfully submitted.

The force is composed as follows: 1 chief, 1 inspector, 1 captain, 6 lieutenants, 16 sergeants, 16 detectives, 387 patrolmen, 1 surgeon, 1 secretary, 1 assistant secretary, 1 clerk, 1 assistant superintendent of police alarm, 1 batteryman, 1 chief lineman, 3 linemen, 1 chief operator, 6 operators, 1 matron, 5 janitors, total 452 (including 59 vacancies and positions not filled).

Total number of arrests for the year 7910, an increase of 1106, or 16.25 per cent over the preceding year. A partial explanation of this unusual growth in one year may be found in the fact that the arrests of foreign born increased 485, or 43.4 per cent. of the entire increase. Five years ago the statistics of arrests for this department showed that 64.24 per cent. were native born and 35.76 per cent. foreign born; the past year the percentage of native born has decreased to 56.90, while foreign born increased to 40.10.

The much needed addition of 50 patrolmen recently provided by your Honorable Body gives the department 387 officers of that rank. This entire number is under the immediate supervision of 16 sergeants, an average of 26 patrolmen to each sergeant. During the night tour of duty this average increases to one sergeant for every 30 men, which is more than an officer can properly look after, and is out of all proportion to the number detailed for like service in the police departments of other cities. I would respectfully urge the addition of 10 more sergeants to the force as soon as conditions will permit.

The operation of the department for the year is detailed in the annexed tables.

SIR:—I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending March 31, 1907.

No serious interruptions of the telephone and signal service occurred during the past year. The city has been free of sleet and other storms and aside from several patrol boxes damaged by runaways there have been no troubles of any moment.

The system now comprises 230 sentry-boxes and 265 sets of telephone instruments, the circuits remaining the same in number as heretofore. 33,531 feet of underground cable were put in service; 11,481 feet clay conduit laid; 27 new manholes built; 10 new sentry-boxes purchased and erected; 18 cement foundations built and 67 sentry-boxes painted.

All troubles occasioned by breaks and crosses were promptly remedied.

The service rendered is hereto annexed in tabular form.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE DEPARTMENT.

HEADQUARTERS POLICE DEPARTMENT.

OFFICE OF CHIEF OF POLICE.

MILWAUKEE, WIS., April 13, 1908.

To the Honorable Common Council of the City of Milwaukee:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the operation of the Police Department covering a period of nine months from April 1, 1907, to December 31, 1907.

It has been the custom for years to furnish a report for the year ending March 31, thus making it impossible to arrive at a true comparison of the police figures of Milwaukee with those of other cities, whose annual reports are compiled for the calendar year. Government statistics invariably cover the same period.

The force as now authorized by law is composed of 1 chief, 1 inspector, 1 captain, 6 lieutenants, 16 detectives, 16 sergeants, 387 patrolmen, 1 surgeon, 1 secretary, 1 assistant secretary, 1 clerk, 1 assistant superintendent of police alarm, 1 batteryman, 1 chief lineman, 3 linemen, 1 chief operator, 7 operators, 1 matron and 6 janitors—total 453 (including 38 vacancies December 31, 1907).

Arrests for the period covered by this report numbered 6624. For the same nine months of 1906 they were 6257, an increase of 367. For twelve months of 1907 the total number of arrests made was 8277, being an increase of 552 over 1906.

MILWAUKEE, WIS., December 31, 1907.

John T. Janssen, Esq., Chief of Police:

SIR:—I herewith submit my report for the past nine months, from April 1, 1907 to December 31, 1907.

The 29 patrol box circuits have been rearranged so that additions of territory to the city can be covered by the Alarm System by merely extending the nearest circuit.

To avoid the constant delay experienced in communicating with officers stationed at prominent corners, which has heretofore been accomplished by calling on private individuals to notify officers that they were wanted, five additional call-bells have been placed in patrol boxes, making a total of seven.

All patrol wagons were equipped with three electric lights each, current being furnished by storage batteries.

Nine patrol boxes were damaged by runaway teams and careless drivers; this expense and trouble I am avoiding in some instances by placing the boxes on lot lines or other side of walks.

To facilitate better and quicker service a private telephone line was installed connecting the Emergency Hospital with our switch-board.

During the past nine months 31,432 feet of underground cable was drawn in, 13,112 feet clay conduits laid, 37 man-holes built, 10 new sentry boxes erected, 23 cement foundations made and 99 patrol boxes repainted.

The usual occurrence of breaks, crosses and other troubles were promptly remedied.

The service rendered by patrolwagons, ambulance and operators is hereto attached in tabular form.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to present herewith the annual report of the Police Department for the year ending December 31st, 1908.

The force was increased during the year by the addition of one operator, and is now constituted as follows: 1 chief, 1 inspector, 1 captain, 6 lieutenants, 16 detectives, 16 sergeants, 387 patrolmen, 1 surgeon, 1 secretary, 1 assistant secretary, 1 clerk, 1 assistant superintendent police alarm, 1 batteryman, 1 chief lineman, 3 linemen, 1 chief operator, 7 operators, 1 matron, 6 janitors, total 454 (including 13 vacancies).

The total arrests were 8,175, being 129 less than for the previous year. Arrests for drunk and drunk and disorderly numbered 2,958, a decrease of 168 from the year 1907.

The course pursued by your Honorable Body in denying saloon licenses to undesirable applicants and withholding the license privilege from objectionable locations has had the effect of materially improving conditions in the retail liquor traffic. Not a single violation of excise regulations involving a revocation of license has been noted in the city.

Your attention is again respectfully called to the urgent necessity of a new Central Police Station. The present structure, built in 1884, is wholly inadequate to accommodate the constantly growing needs of this department. We are cramped for office room and the building is dingy, unsanitary and unsafe. Three years ago the proposed bond issue of \$250,000 was approved by the voters, but as yet nothing whatever has been done towards relieving the situation. The Armory property also is in such shape that a continued use of the same will necessitate heavy expenditure for repairs.

OF THE

MILWAUKEE, WIS., December 31, 1908.

John T. Janssen, Esq., Chief of Police:

SIR—I herewith submit my report for the past year.

The present system is composed of 240 police alarm booths and 15 police alarm posts, a total of 255 alarm boxes and 287 sets of telephone instruments.

We have $36\frac{1}{2}$ miles of underground cable, ranging in capacity from 6 to 132 conductors, which equals 757 miles of wire.

The first iron police alarm post was installed May 21st at the corner of Grand Avenue and Third Street. There are now 15 of these posts in service. They have proven satisfactory, and, as per your directions, we are preparing to replace wooden boxes with posts, as some of the older boxes are gradually rotting.

December 1st, on Wisconsin Street, between East Water Street and Broadway, about 300 feet of 20-pair underground cable was burned by some high tension current and the service of some South Side circuits was for a short time interrupted.

On December 12th our conduit and cable, containing 40 conductors, went down with the cave-in at Grand Avenue and Third Street; our circuits on the West Side, also those connecting with the upper South Side, were impaired, although not out of commission because of connections by other routes. With a crew of seven men we raised conduit and cable from a depth of seven feet to its former depth of $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet, and in two days' time our system was again in normal condition.

Before the removal of poles by the Wisconsin Telephone Company two extra linemen were hired for a period of two months to rush line construction by fastening cross-arms and contacts on their routes, thereby saving the expense of buying and setting poles.

The buying of an automobile helped me to perform my duties more promptly, and, as the city has grown considerably, it enables me

to cover territory which I could no longer accomplish with a horse and buggy.

In an explosion of gas in a manhole at Walnut Street and Island Avenue on November 19th, Lineman Albert Blundell was burned about the face and hands; he was taken to the Emergency Hospital and later removed to his home, where he is still confined, but expects to report for duty in a few days.

While the dangers of our duties are many, yet during the 27 years' existence of the Police Alarm System only two serious accidents have occurred.

During the past year 30,110 feet of underground cable was drawn in, 12,378 feet of clay conduits were laid, 15 man-holes built, 15 Police Alarm Posts erected, 24 cement foundations made, 141 police booths painted, 16 police posts painted, 7 police booths were damaged by run-away teams and careless drivers.

The usual occurrence of breaks, crosses and other troubles were promptly remedied.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to present herewith the annual report of the Police Department for the year ending December 31st, 1909.

The department at this date consists of 1 chief, 1 inspector, 1 captain, 6 lieutenants, 16 detectives (3 vacancies) 16 sergeants, 387 patrolmen (6 vacancies) 1 surgeon, 1 secretary, 1 assistant secretary, 1 clerk, 1 assistant superintendent of police alarm, 1 second assistant superintendent of police alarm, 1 chief lineman, 3 linemen (2 vacancies) 1 chief operator, 7 operators, 1 matron, 6 janitors; total 453, including 11 vacancies.

The total arrests for the year 1909 was 7817, a decrease of 358 from the previous year. The comparative table of arrests will show the offenses in which the decrease occurred.

The arrest of 134 violators of the automobile speed law demonstrates the usefulness of the motorcycle squad.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., December 31, 1909.

John T. Janssen, Esq., Chief of Police:

SIR:—I herewith submit my report for the past year.

The progress of Police Alarm Telephone Systems has been rapid. I wish to mention that in other cities, as I understand, they have separate or independent telephone lines following their signal circuits; although equally as good and serviceable as ours, it means a large expense for installing and particularly for maintainance, as it requires again as much wire and other supplies and naturally increases trouble such as breaks, crosses, etc.

Our telephone circuits are composed of two perfectly balanced wires; wagon calls are transmitted on one side of the telephone circuit and can be received simultaneously with a conversation without interference and with perfect reliability of action.

The present system has 307 sets of telephones; 272 are in patrol boxes, 35 of which are the new iron posts.

During the past year 17,475 feet of underground cable were drawn in; 20,011 feet of clay conduits laid; 60 manholes built; 20 police alarm posts erected; 29 cement foundations made and 140 police booths painted, four of which were damaged by runaway teams.

A new battery room was built in which 160 small storage batteries were set up to furnish current for the signal apparatus wagon calls, stall-door openers, striking gongs etc. 22 chloride accumulator cells were set up to furnish current for the telephone system.

The old batteries, which were in service for 6½ years, are again set up, only to be used in case of an accident to the operating cells.

We are rapidly placing our wires underground and now have .40 miles of underground cable, which we are increasing each year.

I thought it necessary that all linemen should be accomplished in cable-splicing and joint wiping and they have learned to perform this work.

The usual occurrence of breaks, crosses and other trouble was promptly remedied.

The service rendered by patrol wagons, ambulance and operators is hereto attached in tabular form.
