SURVEY OF ACCIDENTS IN MILWAUKEE CITY YEAR 1925

COMPILED FOR MILWAUKEE SAFETY COMMISSION

Following is a brief review of the traffic accidents in the City of Milwaukee during the year 1925 as reported to the Traffic Bureau.

General

Traffic accidents occurring in the City of Milwaukee during the year 1925 have been analyzed monthly by the City Safety Commission by use of reports prepared by the Traffic Bureau which covers all serious accidents and a large number of those less serious in nature. Monthly analyses are very valuable in following the particular causes for accidents but they do not reveal the increases or decreases over previous months or years accurately, due to the important and ever present factor of weather conditions.

To obtain a reasonable comparison with results of previous analyses an average of all factors entering into accidents and their causes must be considered and to do this an annual analysis can best serve the purpose. The following paragraphs are therefore devoted to a discussion of the causes of various accidents during the year 1925 and comparative figures for previous years.

The total number of accidents reported and analyzed during the past year are 9,344 in number or an increase of 31% over 1924 or 50% over 1923. The results of the analysis in addition to showing a very large increase, compared to 1924 with an increase of 14% over 1923, does not reveal satisfactory improvement in any particular class of accident. Practically all causes of accidents remain constant in number in proportion to the total as shown in the following table and no class has increased or decreased 1% in ratio with the exception of those for which the cause could not be determined from the data given on the report. The number of these accidents shows a decrease of 1.6% in relation to the total which reflects increased efficiency in preparing reports by the Traffic Bureau.

Injuries and deaths actually measure the intensity or seriousness of accidents and although the above results show decreases in ratio to number of accidents, it must be kept in mind that the Traffic Bureau is reporting a greater number of the minor accidents than heretofore.

In 1924 the analysis showed 1 death to every 26 injuries while this year a decrease is shown, namely 1 to each 34.6 injuries which compares quite favorably with the results of 16 states to June, 1925 which showed a ratio of 1 death to 36.6 injuries.

Conclusion

Considering increased traffic the results of the analyses for 1925 does not show any exceptional variation from previous analysis and it would appear that new ways and means must be devised to bring home the lesson of safety to the motorist, the child and the pedestrian. Results of safety campaigns as brought to the attention of the riding and walking public up to the present time do not reveal themselves in the analysis for the year 1925.
