During the year 1929 there were 10,042 criminal complaints made to the Department, compared with 10,137 during the year 1928, a decrease of 95. Of the number of complaints made 4,759 were cleared, a total of 47 percent, as compared with 4,353 complaints cleared during 1928, or 43 percent.

There were 407 residence burglaries reported in 1929, of which 168 were cleared, or 41 percent, as compared with 537 such burglaries during 1928, of which 213 were cleared, or 39 percent.

There were 587 non-residence burglaries reported in 1929, of which 204 were cleared, or 35 percent, as compared with 667 such burglaries in 1928, of which 193 were cleared, or 29 percent.

Assault and Robbery, including Highway Robbery complaints reported during 1929 totaled 198, of which 135 were cleared, or 68 percent, as compared with 125 such complaints during 1928, of which 25 were cleared, or 20 percent.

Murders decreased from 10 during the year 1928, of which 8 were cleared, to 9 during 1929, all of which were cleared.

Forgeries increased during 1929, there being 691 such complaints of which 566 were cleared or 32 percent, as compared with 583 complaints during 1928, 257 of which were cleared or 44 percent.

Complaints of Fraudulent Issue of Bank Checks totaled 312 during 1929, of which 191 were cleared or 61 percent, as compared with 301 such complaints in 1928, of which 184 were cleared, or 51 percent.

Complaints of Grand Larceny, excluding Automobile Thefts, during 1929 totaled 1792, of which 591 were cleared, or 33 percent, as compared with 1690 such complaints during 1928, of which 475 were cleared, or 28 percent.

The total value of monies and property lost through crime during 1929 was \$1,233,057, of which amount \$923,446 was recovered, or 75 percent, as compared with \$1,518,068 lost through crime in 1928, of which amount \$1,101,652 was recovered, or 72 percent.

HOMICIDES

DOUBLE MURDER

On February 17th, Aaron Moore (col), shot and killed Bessie Terrell and Erwin Brewer, both colored. Moore was arrested on February 18th and later formally charged with both murders. He was found guilty in Municipal Court on the first count and on March 6th sentenced to life imprisonment in the Wisconsin State Prison. The second count of murder against Moore was noled in Municipal Court on March 20th, 1929.

MURDER

On February 17th, George Goff (col), was shot by Tony Farino, an Italian, who was arrested the same day. Goff died as a result of the wound March 2nd, 1929. Farino was charged with Murder and was found guilty by a Jury in Municipal Court of first degree murder. On December 31st, 1929 he was sentenced to life imprisonment in the Wisconsin State Prison.

JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDE

On February 21st, 1929, Francisco Fernandez (Mexican), stabbed to death one Dolores Sanchez (Mexican), after several shots were fired at him by Dolores Sanchez. Fernandez was arrested the same day and on February 25th, at the Coroner's inquest, a verdict of Justifiable Homicide was returned and Fernandez was released from custody.

MANSLAUGHTER. FOURTH DEGREE

On March 3rd, Edward Ozowski had an argument with one Peter Polak and struck him on the jaw with his fist. Polak fell to the sidewalk and fractured his skull and died the same day. Ozowski was arrested the same day and charged with Manslaughter, Fourth degree. He was found guilty in Municipal Court and on April 4th was sentenced to serve from 1 to 2 years in the Wisconsin State Reformatory.

MURDER AND SUICIDE

On June 10th, Oscar Traub stabbed his divorced wife to death, Laura Muchlbach Traub, and then shot and killed himself.

JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDE

On May 23rd, Claude Soeloy, age 26, while resisting arrest and running away from Police Officers William Lorenz, Clarence Block and Maurice Bornier, was shot by one of the officers and died on June 8th as a result of the shooting. The Coroner's verdict was that Soeloy came to his death by Accidental Homicide, by some unknown Police Officer.

MURDER

On July 15th, John Dancik, Jr., shot and mortally wounded Miss Dollie Trevlic. Miss Trevlic died on July 17th, 1929. Dancik was arrested the same day and later tried and found guilty of Murder - First Degree, and on September 19th was sentenced to life imprisonment in the Wisconsin State Prison.

MURDER

On July 23rd, Vincenzo Mangino, age 82, stabbed to death his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Victoria Mangino, who died on July 26th. Mangino was arrested the same day and charged with Murder - First Degree. On September 4th he was committed by the Municipal Court to the Central State Hospital for Insane, at Waupun.

MANSLAUGHTER - FIRST DEGREE

On September 16th, Joseph Lakota was stabbed and mortally wounded during a free-for-all fight in a saloon. Lakota died the same day after naming one Peter Kish as his assailant. Kish was arrested the same day and charged with Manslaughter, First Degree. The charge against Kish was dismissed October 16th in Municipal Court.

MANSLAUGHTER - FIRST DEGREE

On October 4th, Margaret Tremel, age 19, gave birth to a child and shortly thereafter strangled it to death with a towel. She was arrested the same day and charged with Manslaughter, First degree, was found guilty in Municipal Court on November 18th and sentenced to serve 5 years in the Wisconsin Industrial Home for Women, Taycheedah, Wisconsin.

MANSLAUGHTER - SECOND DEGREE

On December 2nd, Leon Duarte (col) shot and killed her Mexican husband, Manuel Duarte. Leon Duarte was arrested shortly after the shooting. She was found guilty of Manslaughter - Second Degree in Municipal Court and on December 9th sentenced to serve from 5 to 10 years in the Wisconsin State Prison.

MISSING PERSONS

During the year 1929, a total of 1,337 persons were reported as missing from their homes in this city, of which number 1,273 have been reported located or returned, leaving 64 unaccounted for.

Of the 64 persons still missing or unaccounted for, 44 are males and 20 females.

SUICIDES, ATTEMPTED SUICIDES AND SUDDEN DEATHS

During the year 1929 the Police Department investigated 253 cases of suicide or attempted suicide and 223 cases of sudden death.

Of this number 160 were males and 93 females.

Investigation indicated that most of the women attempted suicide, because of family quarrels and others because of despondency due to ill health.

Many reasons are given for males who attempted or committed suicide, among which are failure in business, lack of employment, family quarrels, despondency and ill health.

Of the 223 investigations made of sudden deaths, 178 were males and 45 females. The causes of such deaths were attributed mostly to heart trouble, epilepsy and alcoholism.

STOLEN AUTOMOBILES

During the year 1929 there were 2,032 automobiles stolen in the City of Milwaukee, 1,888 of which were recovered. This Department also recovered 29 automobiles which had been stolen here prior to 1929, making a total of 1917 such recoveries, or 94 percent as compared with 2,358 automobiles stolen in 1928 and 2,260 recoveries, or 96 percent.

In addition to the 1917 automobiles recovered which were stolen in Milwaukee, 108 were recovered that had been stolen in other cities, making a grand total of 2,025 stolen automobiles recovered by this Department during the year 1929.

Of the 2,032 automobiles stolen in Milwaukee 1,564 were recovered within a period of 48 hours after the theft had been reported.

The valuation of the automobiles stolen in Milwaukee during 1929 was \$866,354.00 and the recovery valuation \$829,495.00, as compared with automobiles valued at \$1,039,573 stolen during 1928, of which the recoveries totaled \$1,019,547.00.

The number of arrests for Automobile Theft during the year was 222 as compared with 186 during the year 1928.

CRIMINAL IDENTIFICATION

During the year 1929 there were 2,271 prisoners fingerprinted in the Bureau of Identification, as compared with 1,558 during the year 1928.

There were 3,344 fingerprint classifications received from other jurisdictions during the year, as compared with 1,324 during 1928.

A total of 5,615 fingerprint classifications were added to our files during the year, as compared with 3,377 during the previous year.

During 1929 a total of 6,348 fingerprint classifications of 1,587 prisoners in Milwaukee were sent to other Bureaus of Identification, as compared with 4,476 such classifications from 1,119 prisoners during the year 1928 sent to the same Bureaus.

There were 1587 prisoners photographed in the Bureau of Identification during the year 1929, who had not been previously photographed in Milwaukee, as compared with 1,119 prisoners photographed during 1928, an increase of 468.

6,348 photographic prints, together with fingerprints, were sent to other bureaus of identification.

1,587 photographs, of prisoners not previously photographed in Milwaukee, were added to our photograph gallery.

226 photographs of prisoners not previously photographed in Milwaukee were added to our Bertillon file.

175 photographs were taken of former offenders who had been photographed in Milwaukee, to replace old pictures of such offenders.

175 photographs taken of former offenders were likewise placed in the Bertillon file.

800 photographs were made for other police jurisdictions.

313 photographs were given to local newspapers.

56 photographic prints were made of murder scenes.

62 photographic prints were made of automobile accidents.

611 Miscellaneous photographs were taken and used for special investigation.

88 photographs were made to replace those removed from our gallery and used in special investigations, and broken photographs.

139 photographs were taken of members of this Department.

A total of 10,585 photographic prints were made during the year 1929, as compared with 7,071 made during the year 1928.

In addition to the above, there were 1,451 photostatic copies made of fingerprints, fraudulent checks and other documents with the new Photostat machine, which was acquired by this department early in the year.

PAWN DIVISION

The Pawn Division in the Bureau of Identification recovered property during the year 1929 as compared with property recovered during 1928, as shown in the following tabulation:

TRAFFIC DIVISION

Following is a report of traffic accidents in the City of Milwaukee during the year 1929 classified under one of the following groups:

1. Collisions involving motor or horse-drawn vehicles
2. Collisions involving street cars or trains.
3. Collisions involving pedestrians or children.
4. Miscellaneous collisions.

The causes of various accidents have also been combined to such a degree as would permit proper comparison and reduce the possibility of too voluminous a report which would lessen the value of the comparison. The numerous causes were condensed into thirteen groups and these have also been retained since the beginning of these analyses.

The analysis for the year 1929 includes 11,805 accidents of all kinds as compared with 11,472 in 1928 and 12,135 in 1927. This is an increase of 2.9% over 1928 and a decrease of 2.7% from the total in 1927.

During the year 1928 a small reduction was shown over previous years, but inasmuch as this was the first reduction shown since these analyses were started, and that the increase of 1929 over 1928 is still less than the total during 1927, it appears that the increase in the total number of accidents has been curbed.

The tabulation on the following page has been prepared to show the relative weight of the various causes and is quite interesting when compared with the ratio for previous years.

POLICE TRAINING SCHOOL

Military drill, under the direction of Major, U.S.A., was conducted from January 14, 1929 to May 31, 1929, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays of each week. Each man, except patrol wagon and ambulance men, and those who were not physically fit, were assigned to companies and required to drill once each week; Mondays, 268 men; Wednesdays, 255 men; Fridays, 255 men. Total--57 drills.

Regular classes in Training School were conducted from October 29th, 1929, to December 23, 1929, there being two classes each day except Saturday and Sunday, and on Wednesday there were three, making a total of eleven classes each week. 11 classes per week, 86 classes, average attendance 30 to 100. Total attendance 5,800.

Eight classes for 15 yr. men (held twice each month) average attendance of 52 per class. Total attendance 411.

Special classes held for men who were members of the Department less than a year, 45 classes. Total attendance 372.

One year men attended regular school during the summer, one class each day, except Saturday and Sunday, from July 6 to October 28, 1929.

Special classes for recruits, 3 hrs. per day for first 30 days. Classes average 1 to 34 each. 205 classes, 4,102 attendance.

Target instruction and practice with pistol, 34 classes, 596 total attendance. Target practice with pistol (one year men) 20 classes, 332 total attendance.

Instruction and target practice with the following:

Shot guns, rifle, pistol, machine gun, tear gas bombs, etc.

Shot-gun, rifle, machine gun, pistol, target practice was held each day except Sunday, from July 5, 1929, to November 11, 1929. Classes average 5 to 10 per class.
