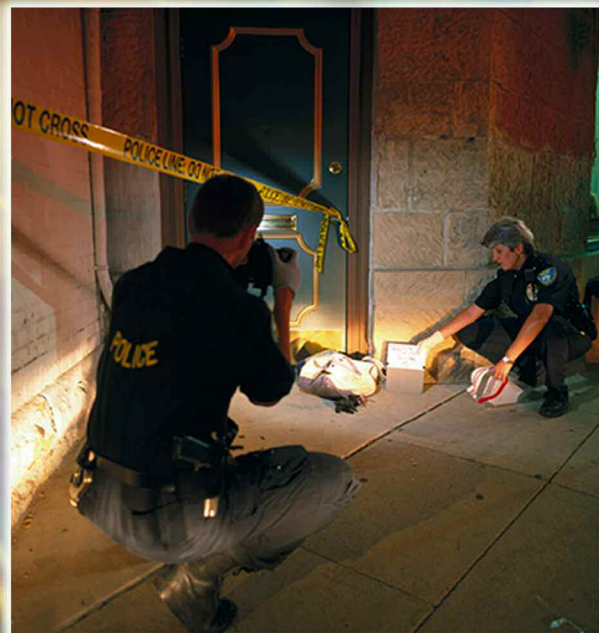

## Message from the Chief

During 2005, one of my main objectives was to emphasize the reduction of violent crime. While we experienced a reduction in several crime categories, overtime expenditures, and the number of citizen complaints over last year, we began to experience a rise in homicides. The loss of human life is unacceptable, and we are continually searching for ways to reduce occurrences of this nature. They negatively impact society on a number of different levels. It is hoped that our work with the Homicide Review Committee will shed some light on the causes, as well as, preventative measures. This grant-funded initiative is examining homicides on a case-by-case basis and applying the resources of multiple agencies/organizations to try to resolve the issues that contribute to the use of violence.

The Milwaukee Police Department joins law enforcement agencies throughout the world in heightening our emergency preparedness. Our recent experience with Hurricane Katrina demonstrates how natural disasters can impact our communities, sometimes without warning or sufficient time for planning. Many displaced victims sought shelter in Milwaukee and surrounding municipalities. Their lives were changed and recovery will be long term. It is crucial for us to have an action plan for all types of emergencies.

My efforts to build trust with the community continue. Select Department members meet on a regular basis with the Milwaukee Commission on Police Community Relations, a diverse group of community representatives who have created a mediation agreement designed to reduce conflict and restore positive relations with the police. This year, the Department expanded its outreach efforts by offering its first Citizen's Academy in Spanish. It is hoped the individuals from the Latino community who attend will come to understand our methods of operation, and we, in turn, will understand their perspective.

I continue to demand professional law enforcement service, expecting all police contacts to be conducted with courtesy, dignity, and respect. Our Police Aide Program curriculum has been updated to more closely monitor the



development of these prospective police officers. Implementation of my strategic plan, Progression to Force 2010, continues as I position the Department to meet future challenges.

We continue to update technology to increase our operating efficiency. Our transition to a new automated Records Management System has begun. Electronic booking procedures are currently underway, and training was conducted to enable all Department members to use the new on-line features. To enhance our officer safety and supervisory oversight, automatic vehicle location devices will be installed in our fleet.

With the assistance of the Department of Public Works, automated payment kiosks have been placed in Districts Two, Five, and Six. Plans for additional units in Districts Three, Four, and Seven will permit citizens to purchase permits and pay parking citations more conveniently with credit card options.

Our Firearms Range is undergoing an extensive renovation. Upon completion, it will permit our personnel to train with state-of-the-art features to enhance their firearm capabilities.

In an effort to ensure the integrity of investigations related to hiring, I have decided to move the Background Investigation Section from the Personnel Division to the Professional Performance Division. This will keep background investigation findings separate from the Applicant Review Committee recommendations.

As the Department celebrates its 150th anniversary in September, I am very proud to be leading a quality law enforcement agency with a proud tradition of excellence. I join Department members in celebrating many accomplishments and look forward to more in days ahead.

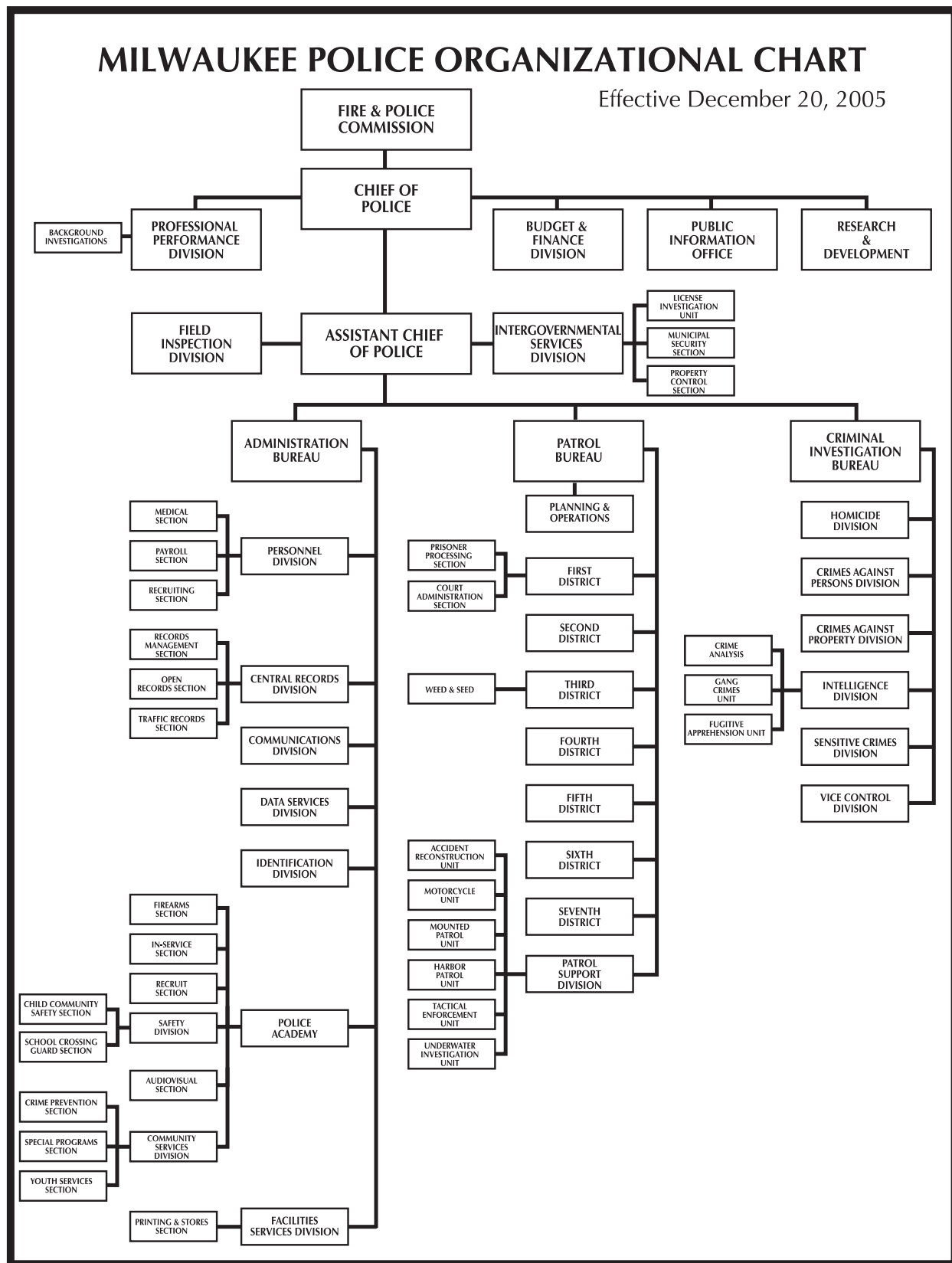

## Professional Performance Division

The Professional Performance Division is responsible for ensuring that all department members achieve and maintain the highest level of professionalism and performance. It is made up of the Risk Management Section, which includes the Early Intervention Program and Civil Litigation Unit, the Internal Affairs Section, Criminal Investigation Section and the Background Investigation Section. This division is responsible for investigating allegations of misconduct on the part of department members, investi-

gating civil claims, administering the department's drug testing program and conducting background investigations of individuals that apply for employment with the department. This division reports directly to the Chief of Police.

The Budget and Finance Division is responsible for the preparation and justification of the department's financial matters and oversees the department's accounting, budgeting and purchasing activities.

The Department relies on Capital Projects Funds, the City's Operating Budget, Asset Forfeiture Funds and Federal, State and Local Grants. Capital Projects are one-time large projects for which the city borrows money. The City's Operating Budget is the amount of the

property tax supported budget that is allocated to the department. Asset Forfeiture Funds are funds awarded to the Department by the Federal Courts from money the department seized during drug related arrests. The Department continuously works to acquire funding through various grants.

THE ASSISTANT CHIEF OF POLICE REPORTS DIRECTLY TO THE CHIEF OF POLICE. THE OFFICE OF THE ASSISTANT CHIEF OF POLICE CONSISTS OF THE FIELD INSPECTION DIVISION AND THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL SERVICES DIVISION, WHICH INCLUDES THE PROPERTY CONTROL SECTION, LICENSE INVESTIGATION UNIT AND MUNICIPAL SECURITY SECTION.

### Intergovernmental Services Division

The Intergovernmental Services Division consists of a Deputy Inspector of Police who continuously examines existing and proposed legislation and court decisions to determine actual or potential impact upon departmental operations. This division is the Department's liaison with city and state government. It ensures proper representation of the Chief of Police at all Common Council committee hearings on matters affecting the department, as well as in the department's interaction with public and private sectors. This division is also responsible for the following sections and units:

#### Property Control Section

The Property Control Section is responsible for all property coming into the possession of department members, the maintenance

of records relating to property and such other duties as may be prescribed by the Chief of Police.

#### License Investigation Section

The License Investigation Unit is responsible for the investigation and processing of city license applications, requests and renewals. It is also the central repository for records and reports pertaining to license investigations.

#### Municipal Security Section

The Municipal Security Section is responsible for mayoral protection, security for the City Hall Complex, security for the Police Administration Building and other duties as may be designated by the Chief of Police or the commanding officer of the Intergovernmental Services Division.

# Administration Bureau

THE ADMINISTRATION BUREAU PROVIDES VITAL AND NECESSARY LOGISTICAL SUPPORT TO THE MILWAUKEE POLICE DEPARTMENT'S PATROL AND INVESTIGATIVE COMPONENTS. IT IS RESPONSIBLE FOR TRAINING, RECORDS RETENTION, COMMUNICATIONS AND TECHNICAL EQUIPMENT, COORDINATION OF CRIME PREVENTION ACTIVITIES AND MAINTENANCE OF ALL DEPARTMENT VEHICLES AND FACILITIES. THE DEPUTY CHIEF OF POLICE OF THE ADMINISTRATION BUREAU REPORTS DIRECTLY TO THE ASSISTANT CHIEF OF POLICE. THE ADMINISTRATION BUREAU IS COMPRISED OF THE POLICE ACADEMY AND THE FOLLOWING DIVISIONS: PERSONNEL, CENTRAL RECORDS, COMMUNICATIONS, DATA SERVICES, IDENTIFICATION AND FACILITIES SERVICES.

## Police Academy

The Police Academy is comprised of the Firearms Section, In-Service Section, Recruit Section, Safety Division and Community Services Division. The Police Academy has been recognized as a Regional Training Center and offers training to various units within the department that require specialized training as well as outside jurisdictions. It is also responsible for providing 32 hours of in-service training for all members of the police force each year as well as providing recruit training and specialized training for civilians.

### Firearms Section

The Firearms Section is responsible for all firearms related training and firearms maintenance. Some of its accomplishments in 2005 are as follows:

- Provided firearms training for Recruit Class 1-2004.
- Participated in the planning, demolition and re-construction of the firearms range. The project was completed within the proposed budget and provides the latest advances in range technology.
- Completed the purchase of a new firearms simulator system that utilizes all of the latest and most

advanced technology.

- Expanded the department's Electronic Control Devices (ECD) program with the purchase of two more Taser units.
- Taught four additional ECD classes and provided instruction at in-service regarding the use of the ECD.
- Redesigned the recruit firearms syllabus to provide continuity of training with both the regular recruit staff and the Firearms Section.
- Developed lesson plans and logistics for shoot-on-shift firearms training.

### In-Service Section

The In-Service Section is responsible for the implementation, delivery and coordination of all training programs in the department. Some of its accomplishments in 2005 are as follows:

- Provided three 8-hour in-service sessions for all police members that covered mandated topics such as cultural competence and the National Incident Management System (NIMS).
- Updated personnel on procedural changes required by court rulings.
- Trained the entire department in the new

Records Management System (RMS).

- Completed the development of a new course on Temporary Holding Facilities (THF) and trained THF instructors.
- Coordinated the college student internship program.
- Provided nationally recognized presenters to train department members on topics such as Risk Management and Ethics Based Leadership.
- Two supervisors received Major Incident Response Team (MIRT) training.
- Provided in-service training to police aides and civilian personnel and specialty training such as crisis negotiations and laser/radar operations.

## Recruit Section

The Recruit Section is responsible for the training of recruit officers. Some of its accomplishments in 2005 are as follows:

- Provided training for Recruit Class 1-2004, which started on 12-6-04.
- Provided training for thirty newly

hired police aides.

- Incorporated five new instructors to the recruit training process.
- Restructured the recruit-training curriculum.
- Updated scenario-based training sites.
- Participated in a committee to evaluate and revise the Police Aide Program.
- Formed a committee to evaluate the Field Training Officer (FTO) program.
- Maintained a liaison with the District Attorney and City Attorney to identify and correct training needs as they arose.

## Administrative/Office Staff

The administrative and office staff at the Police Academy performed numerous functions to ensure the smooth operation of the many components of the Police Academy. Some of their accomplishments in 2005 were:

- Conducted ballistic vest inspection for the entire department.

- Modified annual shirt ordering process resulting in substantial budget savings.
- Completed transition of police aide uniforms.
- Inspected, repaired and replaced issued equipment as necessary.

## Audiovisual Section

The Audio Visual Section is responsible for providing audio/visual support to the department. Some of its accomplishments in 2005 are as follows:

- Updated computer and printer systems utilizing the State Roll Call Law Grant.
- Produced four Roll Call Law Videos for the State of Wisconsin.
- Produced Milwaukee's Most Wanted television program.
- Produced and distributed numerous roll call and training videos.
- Installed cameras, microphones and video recording equipment in interview rooms.

## Safety Division

The Safety Division is responsible for providing school crossing guard protection and implementing policies and educational programs aimed at reducing accidental deaths and injuries throughout the City of Milwaukee. Some of its accomplishments in 2005 are as follows:

- Developed public safety announcements regarding water safety, firearms safety and accidental poisoning.
- Worked with the Personnel Division to identify initiatives to reduce the number of workers compensation injuries within the department.
- Provided training programs to 219 school crossing guards and 20 substitutes.
- Provided 40 hours of training to 63 newly hired school crossing guards and substitutes.
- Conducted 23 studies to determine either the placement and/or elimination of school crossing guards at various locations.
- Provided 12 student safety cadet programs and 2 cadet advisor in-service sessions.
- Held a safety cadet recognition event for 495 students.
- Helped develop water safety programs and pamphlets in English and Spanish.
- Provided pedestrian safety information to 214 schools and pre-school pedestrian safety in-service for teachers.
- Implemented a federally funded pedestrian safety curriculum in six pilot schools.
- Provided child safety seat inspection at health fairs and community events.
- Coordinated four bicycle rodeos.
- Received and investigated 26 line of site ordinance violations.
- Conducted 55 defensive driving classes attended by 848 participants.

# Administration Bureau

## Community Services Division

The Community Services Division applies proactive efforts and measures to prevent crime and enhance the quality of life throughout the City of Milwaukee. Some of its accomplishments in 2005 are as follows:

- Maintain and update 152 crime prevention brochures.
- Translated 12 brochures into Spanish and 13 into Hmong.
- Made over 100 presentations using Power Point format.
- Distributed 5,000 "WeTIP" bulletins in English and Spanish, and posted 35 billboards.
- Maintained the "Catch Auto Thieves" program registrations.
- Responded to 22 homicides with Community Liaison Officers and the Community Partners Organization.
- Four members of the division received 16 hours of block watch training.
- Coordinated Police Athletic League (PAL) basketball program involving 200 young people.
- 105 students participated in the PAL Play Because I Read program.
- PAL developed a partnership with the Pewaukee Police Department to take 30 children from Milwaukee fishing on Pewaukee Lake.
- 28 PAL athletes qualified to participate in the Junior Olympic Games.
- Maintained the Auxiliary Police Officer Program with 155 Auxiliary Officers who participated in 57 events city-wide.
- Maintained the Police Explorer Program with 118 youths.
- Provided the first Citizen's Academy in Spanish.

## Personnel Division

The Personnel Division is responsible for the administration of personnel, ensuring that the provisions of the various labor contracts covering department members are complied with, and other

duties as may be prescribed by the Chief of Police are executed. The division is comprised of the Medical Section, Payroll Section and Recruiting Section. The following are some of the division's accomplishments in 2005:

- Processed 70 promotions.
- Processed 364 record requests and employment verifications
- Hired approximately 72 school crossing guards, office assistants, custodial workers, telecommunicators, dispatchers and telecommunicator supervisors.
- Assisted in the hiring of one police recruit class and one police aide class.
- Reviewed 313 applicant backgrounds at the Applicant Review Committee and Chief of Police levels.
- Published orders, memos, directives and postings.
- Participated in over 32 recruiting events
- Held 48 "Chief Step" grievance hearings.

### Medical Section

The Medical Section monitors the status of personnel on sick or injury leave and maintains medical records. In 2005, the section processed 7,200 sick and injured reports and 1,200 Worker's Compensation Reports. It also reviewed and processed 485 requests for leave under family medical leave of absence, as well as maternity leave, childrearing leaves and unpaid medical leaves of absence.

# Administration Bureau

## Payroll Section

In 2005, the Payroll Section coordinated the transportation of approximately 9,000 overtime cards for input into the On-Line Time Entry System, conducted several salary and overtime audits, completed over 3,000 payroll adjustments, processed 218 separations and processed 120 separation buyouts. The section also processed \$3,940,000 in "special pays" for certification, uniform, variable shift

assignment pay and longevity. The section was involved in providing in-service training, serving on the Applicant Review Committee and Police Aide Committee, responding to surveys and information requests and attending monthly finance and personnel meetings.

## Recruiting Section

The Personnel Division serves as the Department's recruiting liaison for the Fire and Police Commission to assist with

coordinating recruiting events. There are several Police Officers trained in the Department to actively recruit potential candidates for employment with the Milwaukee Police Department. During 2005, with the help from members of the Community Services Division, the Department participated in over 30 recruiting events and attended various MPS and private schools in the City.

## Central Records Division

The Central Records Division is responsible for the gathering and storage of all reports, correspondence and other data as it relates to criminal activity. It is also responsible for maintaining all records relating to traffic accidents and administering compliance with the Wisconsin State Statutes relative to access to records in the custody of the department. It is comprised of the Records Management Section, Open Records Section and the Traffic Records Section.

## Records Management Section

In 2005, the Records Management Section began utilizing and converting all 2005 incident reports to the Tiburon Automated Reporting System (ARS) and Records Management System (RMS). Upon completion of department-wide

training, this system will provide all department members immediate, desktop access to all incident reports. The following are some of the other accomplishments of the section in 2005:

- The Word Processing Unit transcribed 151,712 minutes of dictation resulting in 23,547 various incident related reports.
- Entered 61,305 reports into the ARS
- The Telephone Reporting Unit handled 16,934 calls for service.
- 4,872 new missing person records were processed through CIB/NCIC
- 933 fire reports were processed.
- 725 sudden death reports were processed.
- 1,440 sick and injured person reports were processed.

In 2005, the Records Management

Section assumed responsibility for the validation and submission of crime statistics. As of 2005, the method used to report these statistics has been changed from the Uniform Crime Report (UCR) system to the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS).

## Open Records Section

The Open Records Section is responsible for the compilation, review and dissemination of department records as mandated by the Open Records Law. In 2005, the Open Records Section processed 24,396 requests resulting in the release of 96,604 records.

## Traffic Records Section

In 2005, the Traffic Records Section provided courteous and prompt service to the public regarding all traffic and court procedures, including parking, traffic, municipal

citations, information on the registration of vehicles, operator licenses and traffic laws. In 2005, this section

processed 96,096 traffic citations.

## Communications Division

The Communications Division is responsible for providing prompt and proper handling of all department communications by telephone, teletype and other means. The division is also responsible for dispatching squads and providing prompt and proper servicing of other city, county, state, federal and suburban emergency service radio communications through the facilities of the Milwaukee Police Department. The following are some of the accomplishments of the division in 2005:

- Completed upgrades necessary to receive 9-1-1 wireless calls.
- Applied for state reimbursement grants on 9-1-1 project resulting in the recovery of \$2,036,690 in costs for the city.
- Changed our cell phone vendor resulting in significant savings to the department.
- Telecommunicators and dispatchers call times were reduced by more than one minute.
- Took over installation, repair, and maintenance of the Milwaukee Fire Department mobile data units.

## Data Services Division

The Data Services Division is responsible for the management of the department's data communications and information systems. Personnel assigned to the division manage all departmental computer production systems and provide technical support of department systems to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, National Crime Information Center, Wisconsin Crime Information Bureau, Department of Transportation and the Criminal Justice Information System. The following are some of the accomplishments of the division in 2005:

- Implementation of the CAD-Automatic Vehicle Location System.
- Implementation of the RMS-State District Console.
- Implementation of the District Attorney and City Attorney direct MPD network access system.
- Saved budget dollars through in-house printer repair program.
- Set up new computer training rooms at the Police Academy.
- Completed crime analysis computer upgrades.
- Installed department-wide booking printers.

# Administration Bureau

## Identification Division

The Identification Division is responsible for collecting, examining and process-

ing fingerprints. The personnel assigned take, process, and maintain crime scenes and prisoner photos and collect evidence at crime scenes. The division also examines documents, handwriting samples and surveillance tapes. The following are some of the accomplishments of the division in 2005:

- 14,244 calls for service were answered.
- 5,589 latent cases were assigned to incidents. Fingerprint evidence was recovered in 2,632 of the cases and 1,211 persons were identified from the recovered latent impressions.
- The fingerprints of 37,795 prisoners were processed and identified.
- 141,302- 35mm photographs were taken.
- 183,543 images, including 42,241 digital images were processed, filed and stored by the photo lab.
- The fingerprints on 340 disputed municipal citations were compared, resulting in 256 instances in which someone other than the defendant in court was identified.
- 1,113 surveillance tapes were processed, compared to 739 in 2004 and 547 in 2003.
- 3,690 persons were fingerprinted for licensing requirements.

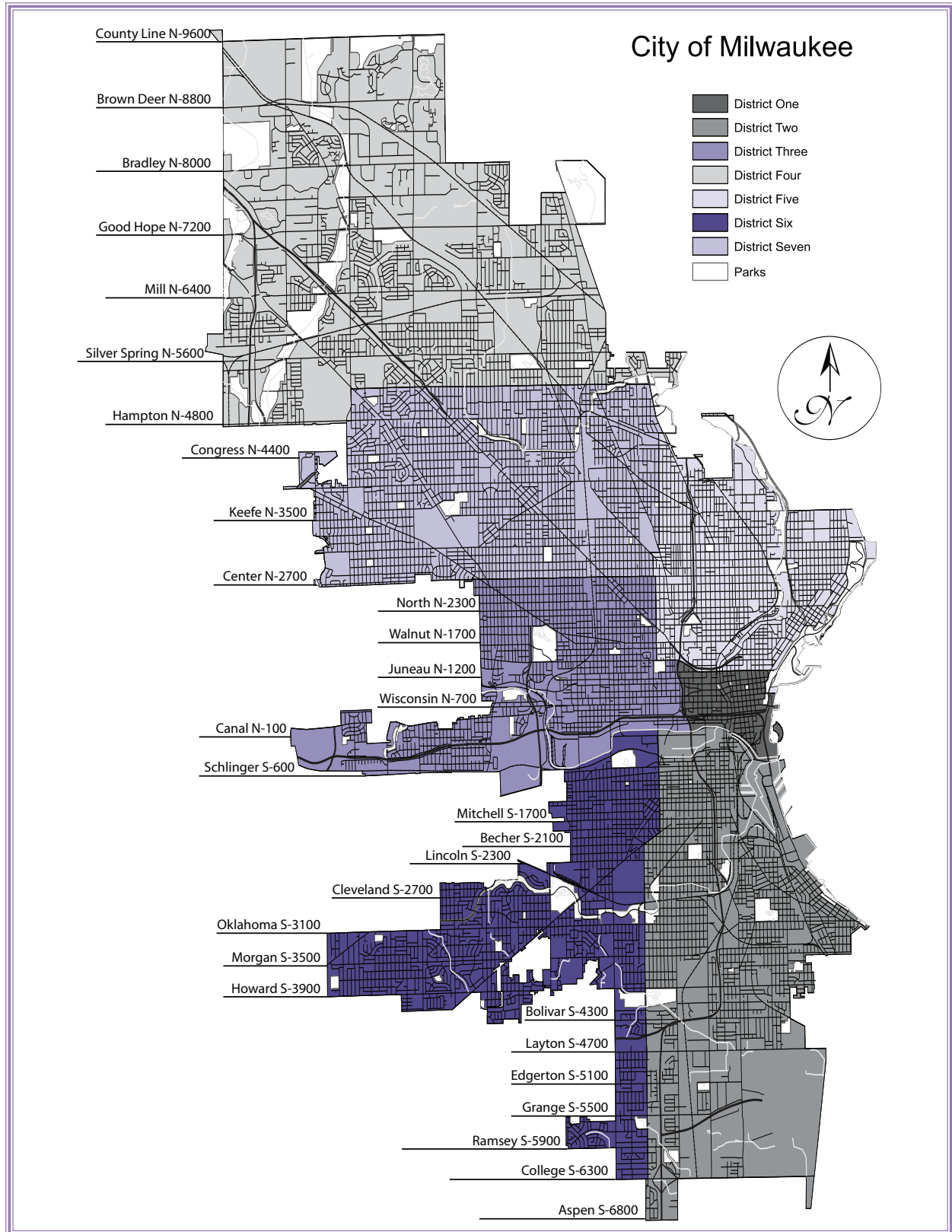

The Facilities Services Division is responsible for providing the maintenance of equipment and facilities, as well as the administration and record keeping associated with our vehicle fleet. The following are some of the divisions accomplishments in 2005:

- Installed new heating, ventilation and air conditioning equipment in the Police Administration Building (PAB).
- Completed remodeling of the firearms range \$15,000 under budget.
- Restitution for damages to police equipment and property was court ordered in the sum of \$322,293.00. The actual collectable amount returned to the city's general fund was \$276,750.00.
- Two Arson Unit vehicles and an Accident Investigation Unit vehicle were replaced with new vans.
- \$80,000.00 was saved by out-sourcing police vehicle set-ups.
- 16 jail cells were removed from the 6th floor of the PAB to make room for the new line-up stage and interrogation rooms.
- A new blood evidence drying room was built for the CIB.
- A \$265,501 reduction in vehicle maintenance costs was experienced compared to 2004.
- The Printing and Stores Section saved \$25,000 in office supplies after assuming responsibilities for all department toner cartridges, color cartridges, and roll media for six larger printers.

THE PATROL BUREAU IS COMPRISED OF THE PLANNING AND OPERATIONS DIVISION, THE SEVEN POLICE DISTRICTS AND THE PATROL SUPPORT DIVISION. THE FUNCTION OF THE BUREAU IS TO PROVIDE FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE PUBLIC PEACE, THE PROTECTION OF LIFE AND PROPERTY, THE DETECTION AND APPREHENSION OF PERSONS ENGAGING IN ILLEGAL ACTIVITY AND THE ENFORCEMENT OF ALL LAWS AND ORDINANCES OF WHICH THE DEPARTMENT TAKES COGNIZANCE.

## Planning and Operations Unit

Planning and Operations is responsible for the planning, logistics and staffing of police personnel for all special events in the City of Milwaukee. These events include Summerfest, U.S. Bank fireworks, presidential motorcades, the ethnic festivals, parades, runs/walks and various

other special events. The division planned and arranged police coverage for 166 special events, utilizing 28,386 work hours and 1,046 daily events throughout 2005. The Milwaukee Police Department began providing police coverage for the Milwaukee Brewers home games at

Miller Park, a function previously performed by the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Department. Planning and Operations handled the planning, logistics and staffing for all 81 home games.

In 2005, the commander of District One was Captain Linda Haynes.

District One consists of devoted and dedicated officers committed to ensuring the reduction and elimination of crime in the downtown area. Some of the district's accomplishments include the following:

- The continued implementation of the handicap permit violation program. The program enforces the laws and ordinances relating to the inappropriate application and usage of handicap permits. The program has received positive recognition throughout Wisconsin and the independent living community.
- The successful policing of the numerous national conventions that convened in the downtown area including the national conference for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and the National Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.
- Continued training of the downtown Public Service Ambassadors.
- Increased police presence during business hours in the downtown

commercial community through increased foot and bicycle patrols.

## Court Administration Section

The Court Administration Section is a subcomponent of District One. It is responsible for processing and handling state misdemeanor cases at the District Attorney's Office, processing municipal citations through the Municipal Court

and monitoring department personnel and resources relating to the municipal and state judicial system.

During 2005, the District Attorney's Office assigned Assistant District Attorneys to the district stations as part of the Community Prosecutors Program. They reviewed hundreds of criminal cases at the district stations. The officers working at the Court Administration Section were responsible for the final preparation on the charged cases and release of the suspects from the uncharged cases.

In 2005, the Court Administration Section processed 18,399 cases from start to finish including 6,916 operating after revocation citations and 898 operating while intoxicated cases.

In 2005, the commander of District Two was Captain Eduardo Negron.

During 2005, the personnel assigned to District Two continued to increase their efforts to combat crime and make the district a safer place for citizens to live, work and visit. District personnel accomplished the following:

- Provided staffing for 25 special events.
- Provided staffing for five Directed Patrol Missions.
- The District Two Anti Gang Unit participated in Safe Street Initiatives resulting in the issuance of 362 uniform traffic citations, 177 municipal arrests, 121 state arrests, 595 field interviews and the recovery of 5 guns.
- The License Premises Squad conducted 234 premises checks.
- The Community Liaison Officer and supervisors attended 219 community meetings.
- The district formed 19 new block watches, increasing the total number of block watches to 42.
- Individual Officers conducted 24 child car seat inspections.

In 2005, the commander of District Three was Captain James Harpole.

During 2005, the dedicated staff at District Three worked diligently with the citizens, business community and other agencies to combat violent crime and enhance the quality of life for the citizens who live and work in the district. Some of the district's accomplishments include the following:

- In March of 2005, the district successfully implemented the Gang Reduction Project (GRP), utilizing a federal grant administered by the State of Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance.
- In June of 2005, an Assistant District Attorney (ADA) was assigned as the district's community prosecutor. This partnership ties in directly with the Gang Reduction Project. In addition to reviewing cases, the ADA works closely with officers of District Three, target-

ing nuisance activities with suppression patrols of the most crime impacted areas of the district. The officers and the ADA developed the District Three Major Violator Program, which identifies the 20 most serious criminal violators in the district, as well as the District Three Major Violator Properties Program, which identifies the five worst nuisance properties.

- The district has assigned duties to its police aides outside of the general office duties. The aides work with the Community Liaison Officer to research and identify nuisance properties, contact landlords, and attend community meetings.
- In the second half of 2005, as a greater emphasis on nuisance abatement, staff from District Three scheduled meetings with some of the most problematic landlords to formulate plans to end the problems at their properties. The meetings were attended by the District Captain, the Community Prosecutor, officers and staff from other concerned agencies.
- Two Probation and Parole Agents were assigned to work out of District Three. They worked with the Community Prosecution Team and the district officers.
- The district began using police aides to conduct underage liquor buys at staggered intervals.
- During 2005, the district Community Liaison Officers engaged in 386 public appearances.

- During 2005, the District Three Captain's Community Crime Analysis Meetings were moved out of the district station house and into venues more accessible to the community. This resulted in more citizens and community organizations attending the meetings.
- A number of Directed Patrol Missions (DPMs) were implemented during 2005 with successful results. These DPMs included auto entries in the area of N. 92nd St. and W. Wisconsin Ave.; burglaries at a metal recycling plant; robberies at restaurants in the area of N. 35 St. and W. Vliet St.; burglaries in the Washington Heights neighborhood; violent crime in the Metcalfe Park neighborhood; and Holiday Presence. The DPMs slowed crime and reduced homicides in the Metcalfe Park neighborhood during the second half of the year.

In 2005, the commander of District Four was Captain Andra P. Williams.

The personnel assigned to District Four worked with businesses, residents and community groups throughout 2005 to reduce crime and improve the quality of life for the citizens of Milwaukee. District personnel accomplished the following:

- The Community Liaison Officers made over 164 public appearances, of which 87 were for block watch meetings.
- 11 new block watches were established in the district
- The Community Liaison Officers distributed approximately 500 crime prevention and resource pamphlets.
- During the holiday season, District Four personnel teamed up with community groups and businesses and conducted a toy and food drive for the needy.
- District personnel identified 27 new nuisance properties.
- A database for daybook entries was implemented within the district. The database enables a more efficient development of crime trends.
- Crime analysis meetings were held

monthly with the community and crime prevention information was disseminated to affected parts of the community.

- Aggressive patrol in the business areas and a focus on major offenders resulted in no robberies being reported in District Four between 4-12-05 and 4-27-05.
- In 2005, District Four had a 10% reduction in overtime as compared to 2004.

During 2005, the personnel at District Five were involved in numerous proactive law enforcement activities aimed at reducing violent crime and enhancing the quality of life within the district. Some of their accomplishments include the following:

- Worked with the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and the UWM

Police Department to increase enforcement of laws targeting underage drinking, illegal taverns and neighborhood disorder. District Five led the city in noise nuisance citations, primarily arising from those enforcement efforts.

- A new office opened for the three Probation and Parole Agents assigned to District Five. It resulted in better communication between the agents and district personnel and closer monitoring of the activities of persons on probation or parole within the district.
- Active involvement in the Violent Crime Reduction Directed Patrol Mission, which was designed to combat the increase in homicides. The intensive patrols immediately resulted in a reduction of crime and disorder in the two areas of operations within District Five.
- District Five managed the Joint Investigative Tobacco Compliance Initiative,

a citywide program in conjunction with Strive Media Incorporated and the Milwaukee Health Department.

- The district's Anti Gang Unit worked with the Community Prosecutor to successfully target street level drug dealing and gun possession.

During 2005, the personnel of District Six demonstrated their commitment and dedication to the community they serve. Some of their accomplishments include the following:

- Significant overall reduction in Part 1 Crimes compared to the previous year, particularly in homicides, robberies, shootings, sexual assaults and burglaries.
- Inauguration of District Captain's Squads on the day and early shifts. The day shift squads conduct follow-up on major offenses, arrest felonious perpetrators and clear major crimes. The early shift squad monitors licensed premises.

## District Six

- Assignment of a second Community Liaison Officer to assist with evening events, help rebuild the Block Watch Program and assist with Spanish crime analysis meetings at various locations.
- Several new Block Watch groups have been formed.
- Overtime was reduced by more than 4% from the prior year.
- Expanded the Community Prosecution Unit to include the issuance of misdemeanor cases from the district and established a Probation and Parole Liaison at the district. The Community Prosecutor reviewed approximately 115 cases overall and issued 101 criminal cases (both felony and misdemeanor).
- Neighborhood Strategic Planning (NSP) grant money was used to target specific nuisance activity such as loud music, curfew and truancy.
- NSP grant money was used to increase beat/bicycle patrol in targeted areas.
- District Six produced its own roll call videos specific to District 6 as well as videos to promote police and community relations in the district.
- The District hosted a National Night Out event and block party.
- The District held an Open House in June.
- Collaboration with Layton Boulevards West Community Group resulted in Community Emergency Response Training (CERT) on the south side.
- The district Neighborhood Advisory Committee (NAC) held two public meetings, inaugurated a NAC citizen/business award, raised money for equipment for District Six and produced a calendar.
- With the assistance of the Department of Public Works, automated payment kiosks have been placed in the District to allow citizens to purchase permits and pay parking tickets more conveniently with credit card options.

Tactical Enforcement Unit and the Underwater Investigation Unit. Some of the division's accomplishments in 2005 are:

### Accident Reconstruction Unit

The Accident Reconstruction Unit reconstructed 203 fatal and serious motor vehicle accidents. Specially trained investigators re-construct the dynamics of the accident to determine pre-impact speed of the vehicles, as well as, pre and post crash events based on physical evidence.

### Motorcycle Unit

- Two Sergeants trained through Northwestern University as Motorcycle Instructors.

- Developed and implemented traffic and crowd control plans for Milwaukee Brewers games and special events at Miller Park.
- Tested and acquired window tint meters.
- Tested and acquired moving radar for motorcycles.
- Staffed 43 special traffic enforcement missions which resulted from citizen and aldermanic complaints.
- Provided traffic and crowd control at 219 special events.
- Investigated 10,060 traffic accidents
- Acquired a \$112,000 traffic grant related to the Marquette interchange construction project.

# Patrol Bureau

- Acquired a \$30,000 traffic grant for speeding and seat-belt violations.
- Inspected 136 commercial vehicles, compared to 114 in 2004.

## Homicide Division

During 2005, the Homicide Division investigated 122 homicides. This was an increase of 34 homicides from the 88 reported in 2004, and represents a 38.6% increase. District Two and District Six had

less reported homicides in 2005 compared to 2004. District One had no reported homicides in 2005 and has not had a reported homicide since 2002.

## Crimes Against Persons Division

In 2005, the Crimes Against Persons Division initiated 15 major case files related to multiple robberies believed to be committed by the same suspect(s),

compared to 19 files initiated in 2004. The division successfully cleared 8 of the 15 files resulting in the clearance of 100 related robberies.

## Crimes Against Property Division

The Crimes Against Property Division consists of the High Technology Unit, Auto Squad, White Collar Crimes Unit, Fire Investigation Unit and the Property Crimes Unit.

### High Technology Unit

Department members who are assigned to the High Technology Unit are also assigned to the FBI Cyber Crimes Task Force and the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force. The investigators go on-line as juveniles in chat rooms. In 2005, they arrested 18 adults for attempting to meet children for the purpose of facilitating sexual contact and for possessing child pornography. The unit executed 59 search warrants and performed over 350 forensic examinations of computers and cellular phones in 2005.

### Auto Squad

In 2005, there were 6,508 reported stolen motor vehicles in Milwaukee, compared to

5,743 in 2004. In an effort to combat auto theft, the department has acquired a bait car designed to capture suspects while in the commission of an auto theft.

### White Collar Crimes Unit

The White Collar Crimes Unit investigates matters relating to fraud, forgery, worthless checks, identity theft and embezzlement. In 2005, the unit investigated 635 financial crime complaints.

### Fire Investigation Unit

In 2005, the Fire Investigation Unit investigated 242 arson fires, compared to 262 in 2004.

### Property Crimes Unit

In 2005, there were 4,533 burglaries reported in Milwaukee, compared to 4,795 in 2004; a reduction of 5.3%.

Intelligence Division

In 2005, the Intelligence Division worked collaboratively with other law enforcement agencies and units within the Milwaukee Police Department to effect numerous arrests and the confiscation of hundreds of firearms. Division personnel arrested 2,272 individuals, an increase of 15% over 2004. Felony charges relating to the arrests totaled 2,186, an increase of 37%. The Division also recovered 564 firearms, an increase of 21% from 2004.

The Division was also involved in numerous multi-jurisdictional investigations directed at dismantling several violent

street gangs. Criminal charges were filed against 52 known members of the Latin Kings gang, 35 members of the Cherry Street Mob gang and 22 members of the 2-6 Vice Lords gang.

As a result of investigations conducted by the Intelligence Division personnel, \$316,172.55 in criminal proceeds was seized.

## **Sensitive Crimes Division**

The Sensitive Crimes Division is responsible for the investigation of sexual assaults, crimes against children, domestic violence related crimes and truancy. In 2005, the division investigated 352 child abuse and neglect cases, and 909 sexual assaults resulting in a 91% overall clearance rate. In 36 of the sexual assault investigations, the suspect was a stranger to the victim. The division investigated 201 UCR related sexual assault offenses resulting in an 85% clearance rate, compared to the national average clearance rate of 41.8%.

Officers assigned to the Truancy Abatement Burglary Suppression initiative conducted 8,764 truancy related investigative stops during the 2004-2005 school year, a 2.7% increase over the 2003-2004 school year.

In 2005, the Vice Control Division concentrated on street level narcotics investigations. The Division investigated 2,863 street level narcotics complaints in 2005, compared to 2,060 complaints in 2004, a 39% increase in investigations. Of these investigations, 785 were cleared by arrest, compared to 681 in 2004, a 15% increase. The total number of people arrested for drug offenses in 2005 increased by almost 18% over 2004, and the utilization of search warrants as a tool to investigate narcotics complaints increased by almost 23% compared to 2004.

In 2005, members of the Vice Control Division continued to work in conjunction with federal, state and local agencies in the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) Task Force. The task force continued its efforts to disrupt the flow of illegal drugs in the community and reduce the associated violent crime. The HIDTA Task Force focused on conspiracy type investigations against violent criminal organizations.

Some of the HIDTA Task Force accomplishments include the following:

- Successful Federal RICO (Racketeering Influenced Corrupt Organization) prose-

cution of 52 Latin King street gang members on mostly violent crimes and narcotics crimes charges.

- The Metro Drug Unit was integrated into the HIDTA facility under the direction of the Department.
- For the second consecutive year, over \$1,000,000.00 in cash was seized.
- Conducted seven significant Drug Gang Task Force investigations.
- Dismantled four drug trafficking organizations.
